Day 1: * The Foundation of Love

Devotional: Love: The Key to Welcoming Relationships

Love is the cornerstone of all relationships, and especially so in the church. Jesus' command to "love one another" is not a suggestion but a defining mark of His followers. This love is modeled on how He loved us — sacrificially, patiently, and unconditionally.

In making your church more welcoming, it starts here. Every greeting, every interaction, and every decision should flow from genuine love. This love sees beyond appearances and first impressions. It reaches out to the marginalized, the newcomer, and even those hard to relate to.

Day 2: A Hospitality: Opening Doors with Grace

Devotional: Joyful Hospitality: Welcoming with Open Hearts

Hospitality is more than just opening doors; it's about opening hearts. The Scriptures repeatedly call God's people to practice hospitality — not as an obligation but as a joyful opportunity to demonstrate God's love tangibly.

- Galatians 6:2 "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."







Devotional: Patience and Forgiveness Build Church Unity

In any community, differences and conflicts can arise, but God calls us to unity through patience and love. Ephesians 4:2 highlights humility, gentleness, and patience as key to bearing with one another.

Being welcoming doesn't mean ignoring challenges but facing them with grace and forgiveness. Colossians 3:13 commands us to forgive as Christ forgave us, which is vital to maintaining peace and welcome within the church.

In Galatians 6:2, we are invited to carry each other's burdens — not only physical or emotional but relational. This mutual support fosters deep bonds and breaks down loneliness, helping everyone feel cared for.

As you reflect today, consider how patience and forgiveness can transform your interactions. What barriers exist because of impatience or pride? Ask God to cultivate in you the fruit of patience so that your church community becomes a refuge of love and understanding.

Day 4: (2) Welcoming Strangers as Family

Your Verse

Hebrews 13:2 - "Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it."

Supporting Scriptures

- Matthew 25:35 "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in."
- Leviticus 19:34 "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself."







Day 4: (2) Welcoming Strangers as Family

Devotional: Embracing Strangers as Family in Christ

Welcoming strangers is a radical act that reflects God's heart. Hebrews 13:2 teaches us not to forget hospitality, emphasizing the sacred value of every person who comes through our doors.

Jesus, in Matthew 25, identifies Himself with strangers. When we welcome the unfamiliar, we welcome Him. This perspective transforms how we approach newcomers — not as outsiders, but as cherished members of God's family.

Leviticus 19:34 reminds Israel to love foreigners as their own people. This Old Testament call to inclusion applies to us as well, encouraging a church culture that embraces diversity and breaks down walls of exclusion.

Consider how your church welcomes those who might feel out of place due to culture, background, or life experience. Are there ways to make newcomers feel fully accepted and loved as family? Your attitude and actions can be God's hands and feet to those seeking belonging.

- Mark 10:45 "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve."







Devotional: Humble Service Builds Welcoming Community

Humility and service go hand in hand in creating a welcoming church.

Galatians 5:13 calls us to serve one another humbly, with love as the motive.

Philippians 2:3-4 reminds us to put others above ourselves and consider their needs first. This mindset fosters unity and shows that everyone matters.

Jesus Himself modeled the greatest servant leadership, as Mark 10:45 says — He came to serve, not be served. Imitating Christ's example transforms our relationships, as serving others opens hearts and builds community.

When you approach church life with humility and a servant's heart, you create space for connection and belonging. This week, ask how you can serve others in practical ways that communicate welcome beyond words.

Supporting Scriptures

- Ephesians 4:3 "Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace."
- Colossians 3:15 "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts."







Devotional: Choosing Peace to Foster Church Unity

Peace and unity are key indicators of a welcoming church. Romans 12:18 challenges us to strive for peace with everyone, acknowledging that while we cannot control all relationships, we are responsible for our part.

Ephesians 4:3 urges us to make every effort to maintain unity — a deliberate, ongoing choice that requires humility, forgiveness, and empathy.

Colossians 3:15 calls us to let Christ's peace rule in our hearts, influencing how we respond to conflict and differences.

Welcoming relationships thrive in peaceful, unified environments. Today, evaluate your role in promoting harmony. Are there tensions you need to address? Ask God to empower you to be a peacemaker and bring His unity to your church family.

Your Verse

Supporting Scriptures

- 1 Corinthians 12:12 "Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ."
- Ephesians 5:1-2 "Follow God's example, therefore, as dearly loved children and walk in the way of love."







Day 7: 🎇 Reflecting Christ Together

Devotional: Unity in Christ: A Bold Witness of Love

Our ultimate goal is to reflect Christ's unity and love as one body. In John 17:21, Jesus prays that His followers would be one, just as He and the Father are one. This deep unity reveals God's glory to the world.

1 Corinthians 12:12 reminds us that though we are many parts, we are one body in Christ — each with unique roles but interconnected in purpose.

Ephesians 5:1-2 calls us to follow God's example and walk in love. Together, our relationships become a living testimony of God's grace.

Reflect on how your efforts to build welcoming relationships contribute to this larger picture. When the church lives in visible unity and love, it becomes a powerful witness attracting others to Christ.

Pray for ongoing strength to carry this vision forward and celebrate the joy of serving and belonging in His body.
