# Devotional: Living Justly, Loving Mercy, Walking Humbly

Micah 6:8 is one of the Bible's most memorable summaries of how God wants us to live. It doesn't demand grand religious acts but calls us simply to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with God. The context of this verse is important: God is addressing a people guilty of corruption and hollow worship, reminding them that He desires heartfelt obedience more than ritual sacrifices.

What does it mean to "act justly"? It involves fairness in our dealings, standing against injustice, and protecting the vulnerable among us. To "love mercy" goes beyond mere justice to show kindness and grace even when it is not earned. Finally, walking humbly with God recognizes that all our efforts are in submission to Him and rely on His guidance.
