Your Verse

1 John 1:9 – "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness."

Supporting Scriptures

- Psalm 103:12 "As far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us."
- Isaiah 1:18 "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow..."







Day 1: V Understanding God's Forgiveness

Devotional: Accepting God's Complete Forgiveness

Forgiving yourself begins with accepting God's forgiveness. When we make mistakes, especially as teens trying to find our way, guilt can take root and feel overwhelming. But God's promise in *1 John 1:9* reminds us of a beautiful truth: when we confess our sins, He is faithful to forgive and to cleanse us completely. This isn't just a surface-level forgiveness; it's restoring you to a pure state before Him.

Often, the hardest person to forgive is ourselves. Shame tries to convince us that we're unworthy or stuck in our past errors. However, God's forgiveness is not limited or temporary; it's full and complete, removing our wrongs as far as the east is from the west (*Psalm 103:12*). When we understand this, it begins to dismantle shame.

Take time today to open your heart to God's promise. Confess what burdens you and accept His forgiveness fully. Remember, God isn't keeping a scoreboard of your mistakes; He desires restoration and freedom for you.

Day 2: Breaking Free from Shame

Devotional: Living Free from Condemnation and Shame

Shame can feel like a prison, but God's Word offers freedom. *Romans 8:1* declares that there is no condemnation for those in Christ Jesus. This is not just empty hope; it is a promise that guilt and shame don't have the final say over your heart or your identity.

As teenagers, it's easy to believe lies about ourselves—'I'm not good enough,' 'I'm defined by my mistakes,' or 'I don't deserve love.' But Psalms reminds us that God is near to those crushed in spirit (*Psalm 34:18*). He understands the pain shame causes and offers healing.

God also promises in *Hebrews 10:17* that He will remember our sins no more, meaning He chooses to forget them. When we accept this, it challenges the voices inside telling us we are bound by our past. You are a new creation! Let today be a step toward breaking free from shame's chains.

Jeremiah 29:11 - "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

Supporting Scriptures

- Philippians 3:13–14 "Forgetting what is behind...I press on toward the goal to win the prize."
- 2 Corinthians 5:17 "If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!"







Devotional: Embracing a Hope-Filled Future in Christ

Forgiving yourself is not only about releasing the past, but embracing the future God has for you. *Jeremiah 29:11* reminds us that God has good plans for our lives—plans filled with hope and purpose. When we accept His forgiveness and let go of shame, we position ourselves to walk confidently into that future.

Paul encourages us in *Philippians 3:13–14* to forget what lies behind and press forward toward God's goal for us. This takes courage and faith but it is possible because you are a new creation (*2 Corinthians 5:17*). Your past does not define you.

Today is a chance for a fresh start. Fix your eyes on what God has prepared and move forward with a spirit of hope. Trust that every day is an opportunity to grow, learn, and live fully in God's grace.

3.	Record your prayer asking God for courage to move forward.

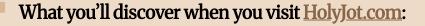




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
