A 7-day Bible study guiding veterans in overcoming PTSD through Scripture, focusing on healing from flashbacks, hypervigilance, and anxiety.





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Introduction

For many veterans, the battle doesn't end when they leave the battlefield. The invisible wounds of *Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)*—flashbacks, hypervigilance, and overwhelming anxiety—can make daily life feel like another front line. Yet, in the midst of these struggles, there is hope and healing through the **Word of God**.

This 7-day Bible study is designed specifically for veterans facing these challenges, offering a Bible-centered path to peace and restoration. Scripture is not only a source of comfort but a powerful tool for battling fear and anxiety. Through the pages of the Bible, God reveals Himself as a refuge, a healer, and a steadfast friend who understands our pain.

Each day, you will explore key passages that speak to the heart of trauma and spiritual restoration. These scriptures remind us that even in our darkest moments, *God's presence never leaves us*. His promises bring strength against the spirals of flashbacks and help calm the mind when hypervigilance threatens to overwhelm.

By reflecting on these truths, journaling your thoughts, and engaging in prayer, you can begin to experience the peace that surpasses all understanding. This journey is not about ignoring pain but facing it with the power of the Holy Spirit and the healing balm of God's Word. Whether you are new to faith or renewing your trust in God, this study invites you to walk the path to emotional and spiritual freedom.

Your Verse

Psalm 46:1 - "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble."

Supporting Scriptures

- Isaiah 41:10 "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God."
- Psalm 34:18 "The LORD is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."







Devotional: Finding Shelter in God's Unfailing Presence

Combatting PTSD often feels like facing an enemy that never takes a break—a constant sense of danger that wears down your spirit. Psalm 46:1 reminds us that God is our **refuge and strength**. He is not distant or detached but an *ever-present help in trouble*. This means when flashbacks or anxiety hit, God is right there with you, ready to protect and sustain.

It's natural to feel overwhelmed when memories and fear assault your mind. Yet God invites you to lean into Him, to take shelter beneath His wings. Isaiah 41:10 encourages us not to be afraid because God is with us. His presence alone dispels fear and offers hope. As you reflect today, imagine placing your burdens at His feet, accepting His promise to be your defender.

When life feels like a battlefield, know that you have a divine ally whose power is unmatched. His heart is tender to the brokenhearted (Psalm 34:18), showing compassion amid pain. As you read and meditate on these verses, let your soul find rest in His faithful love and protection.







Reflect and Apply

1.	How does knowing God is your refuge change your response to moments of anxiety or flashbacks?
2.	In what ways can you invite God to be your strength during daily struggles?
3.	What does it mean for your healing that God is close to the brokenhearted?







Journaling Prompts

1.	Write about a recent moment when you felt God's protection during a difficult time.
2.	List fears or anxieties you want to surrender to God as your refuge.
3.	Reflect on how God's presence has helped you face challenges in the past.







Prayer for Today

Lord, thank You for being my refuge and strength. When my mind is restless and the past haunts me, remind me that You are always near. Help me to trust Your presence and find peace in Your promises. Guard my heart against fear and fill me with Your perfect peace. Teach me to rest in You fully, knowing You care deeply for my wounds. *In Jesus' name, Amen.*

















Day 2: 🛠 Peace That Calms the Storm

Your Verse

John 14:27 - "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."

Supporting Scriptures

- Philippians 4:6-7 "Do not be anxious about anything... And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."
- Isaiah 26:3 "You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are steadfast, because they trust in you."







Day 2: 🛠 Peace That Calms the Storm

Devotional: Embracing God's Peace Amidst Anxiety

The hypervigilance that comes with PTSD can create a constant state of unease, making rest and calm feel elusive. Jesus offers a peace that is distinct from anything the world can give (John 14:27). It is a peace that soothes troubled hearts and casts out fear.

Philippians 4:6-7 instructs us not to be anxious but to present our concerns to God through prayer and thanksgiving. When we do this, God's peace—beyond human understanding—acts as a guard for our hearts and minds. This spiritual peace helps regulate the intense emotions and tension that PTSD brings.

Isaiah 26:3 reminds us that perfect peace comes when we keep our minds focused on God's promises. While it may take time and intentional practice, turning your thoughts toward the Lord can transform your internal battles into moments of calm and trust. Today, lean into this peace Jesus willingly offers. Let it replace anxiety and bring the quiet of soul that your spirit needs.

Your Verse

2 Timothy 1:7 - "For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline."

Supporting Scriptures

- Psalm 94:19 "When anxiety was great within me, your consolation brought me joy."
- Romans 8:15 "...you received a spirit of adoption by whom we cry, 'Abba, Father.'"







Devotional: Living Boldly with God's Spirit Within

PTSD can produce a spirit of timidity, shaking our confidence and making fear feel pervasive. However, 2 Timothy 1:7 reminds us that the Spirit given by God is one of **power**, **love**, **and self-discipline**—not fear. This means your identity in Christ equips you to face the internal battles that trauma presents.

Psalm 94:19 shows that even in moments of intense anxiety, God's consolation can bring about joy and comfort. When you feel overwhelmed, calling upon the Holy Spirit's aid helps shift focus from fear to courage.

Romans 8:15 further reassures us that because we are God's children, we can approach Him as 'Abba, Father'—a close, loving relationship that strengthens us daily. This family connection breaks chains of fear and builds boldness rooted in love.

Today, reflect on releasing fear and stepping into the power God has given you. His Spirit does not make you timid; it enables you to love yourself, others, and God bravely, encouraging disciplined care for your mind and heart.

2.	What does living 'boldly' look like in the context of healing from PTSD?
3.	How does your relationship with God as Father help you confront fear?

Prayer for Today

God, thank You for the Spirit You've given me. Help me to cast off timidity and embrace the power, love, and self-discipline Your Spirit provides. In moments of fear, remind me that You are near, and that I am Your beloved child. Strengthen me to walk in boldness today, trusting Your presence in every challenge. *In Jesus' mighty name, Amen.*

















Your Verse

Lamentations 3:22-23 - "Because of the LORD's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness."

Supporting Scriptures

- Psalm 30:5 "...weeping may stay for the night, but rejoicing comes in the morning."
- Isaiah 43:2 "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you."







Devotional: Hope Renewed Through God's Faithfulness

One of the hardest parts of living with PTSD is feeling consumed or overwhelmed by past pain. Lamentations 3:22–23 offers hope: God's compassions are new every morning, and His faithfulness never fails. No matter how dark the night seems, a fresh start awaits.

This promise invites you to experience each day as a gift of grace, a chance to rest in God's love and healing power. Psalm 30:5 acknowledges that sorrow may linger, but joy returns with the dawn—reminding you that emotional pain is not permanent.

Isaiah 43:2 assures that God is present through every trial, even the floodwaters that threaten to overwhelm. Whether flashbacks or anxiety surge like waves, God promises His protective presence that will not let you be swept away.

Hold onto this truth today: each morning brings new mercies to cover worries, renew hope, and strengthen your spirit. You can face the day knowing God's faithfulness is backing you up continually.

	What does God's faithfulness mean to you personally during seasons of pain?

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Prayer for Today

Day 5: **B** Rest for the Weary









Day 5: Best for the Weary

Your Verse

Matthew 11:28 - "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

Supporting Scriptures

- Psalm 91:1 "Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty."
- Hebrews 4:9–10 "There remains, then, a Sabbath-rest for the people of God; for anyone who enters God's rest also rests from their own work."







Day 5: Best for the Weary

Devotional: Accepting Jesus' Invitation to True Rest

PTSD often leaves veterans physically and emotionally exhausted. The perpetual fight or flight can drain even the strongest. Yet Jesus extends an invitation to all who are weary: to come to Him and receive rest (Matthew 11:28).

This rest is not simply about physical break—it is a deep, soul-level peace that refreshes the heart and renews strength. Psalm 91:1 describes the believer dwelling in God's shelter, resting safely in His shadow, protected and cared for beyond what our eyes can see.

Hebrews 4:9-10 points to the spiritual Sabbath rest available to God's people—a rest where we stop striving and lean fully on God's work, including healing from trauma. Accepting this rest means releasing the burden of fighting alone and allowing Jesus to carry you through.

Today, reflect on what it means to lay down your burdens at Jesus' feet and embrace His rest. Healing begins when we stop trying to cope alone and start trusting in the One who never tires or fails.







Day 5: **B** Rest for the Weary

Reflect and Apply

1.	What burdens are you carrying that you need to bring to Jesus for rest?
2.	How can resting in God's presence help manage the symptoms of PTSD?
3.	What barriers keep you from fully accepting God's invitation to rest?







Day 5: Best for the Weary

Journaling Prompts

1.	Write about what 'rest' looks like spiritually and emotionally for you.
2.	List ways you can intentionally seek God's rest this week.
3.	Reflect on moments when you felt refreshed after resting in God's care.







Day 5: Best for the Weary

Prayer for Today

Jesus, I come to You weary and burdened. Help me to lay down my anxieties, flashbacks, and fears at Your feet. Teach me to rest in Your loving presence and find renewal for my soul. Carry me through the moments when I cannot stand by myself. Thank You for being my refuge and strength. *In Your holy name, Amen.*









Day 6: 1 Light in the Darkness

Your Verse

Psalm 119:105 - "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path."

Supporting Scriptures

- Isaiah 9:2 "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned."
- John 8:12 "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."







Day 6: 1 Light in the Darkness

Devotional: God's Word Illuminates Our Healing Journey

Life with PTSD can feel like navigating through a dense, threatening darkness. The unpredictability of flashbacks and anxiety can cloud the mind and heart. Psalm 119:105 offers hope: God's Word acts as a lamp, providing guidance and illumination.

Isaiah 9:2 prophesies about a great light dawning for those walking in deep darkness—a reminder that God does not leave us lost but shines His presence into every shadow.

Jesus declares in John 8:12 that He is the light of the world. Following Him means choosing to walk away from darkness and into life-giving light that brings clarity, peace, and restoration.

As you meditate today, consider how reading Scripture can help you navigate your healing journey. Let God's truth expose lies of fear and remind you of your value and hope. The Bible provides steady direction when the past tries to pull you off course.

1.	Write about a Bible verse that has brought you comfort or clarity.
	Describe how the 'light' of God's Word contrasts with the 'darkness' of PTSD symptoms.
3.	Plan how you might incorporate daily Scripture reading into your routine.







Day 6: 🗘 Light in the Darkness

Prayer for Today

Lord, thank You for the light of Your Word. When darkness threatens to overwhelm me, let Your Scriptures guide my steps and illuminate my path. Help me to cling to Your truth and walk confidently in the hope You provide. May Your light dispel fear and darkness from every corner of my soul. *In Jesus' name, Amen.*

















Your Verse

Isaiah 40:31 - "But those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint."

Supporting Scriptures

- Nehemiah 8:10 "The joy of the LORD is your strength."
- Psalm 18:32 "It is God who arms me with strength and keeps my way secure."







Devotional: Hope Builds Your Strength to Keep Moving Forward

As this study concludes, remember the promise of Isaiah 40:31: hope in the Lord leads to renewed strength. PTSD can exhaust your physical and emotional resources, but God's hope empowers you to persevere and rise above challenges.

Nehemiah 8:10 declares that the joy of the Lord is your strength—a joy rooted in God's presence, not circumstantial happiness. This spiritual joy fuels resilience in the face of hardship.

Psalm 18:32 assures that God gives you strength and secures your path, providing confidence and protection as you walk forward.

Healing is a journey, not a moment. Each day you place your hope in God, you are empowered to keep going—soaring above difficulties, running without exhaustion, and walking without fainting. Trust in His strength and embrace the new beginnings He offers.







Reflect and Apply

1.	How has hope in God helped you endure your healing journey so far?
2.	What does it mean to find strength in joy through the Lord?
3.	How can you continue to rely on God's strength beyond this study?

Write about ways you have seen your strength renewed through God.
Reflect on how joy in the Lord contrasts with external circumstances.
Plan practical steps to maintain hope and strength in the coming months







Prayer for Today
