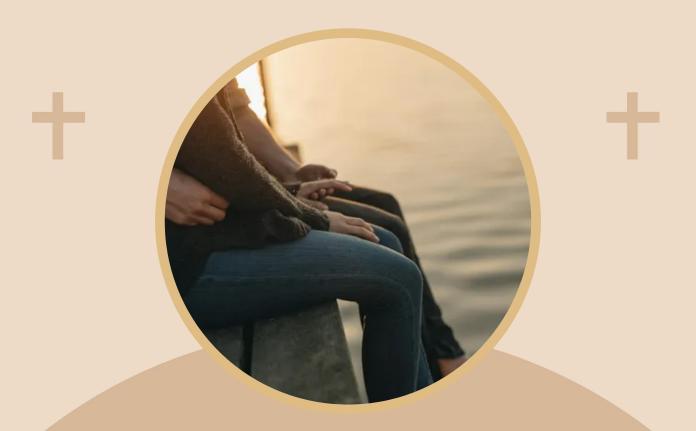
Healing from Regret: A Teen's Journey Through Grace

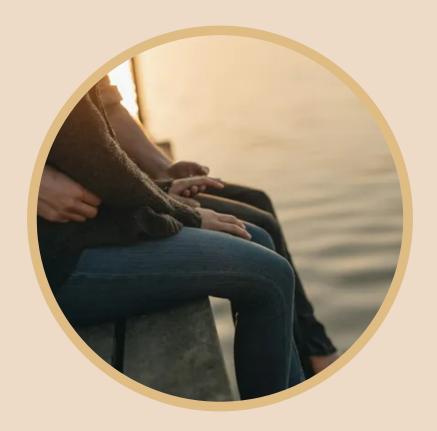

- Isaiah 1:18 "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool."







Devotional: Confession Unlocks God's Forgiveness

Regret can feel like a weight we carry that never lets up. For many teens struggling with sexual sin, the sting of guilt can cloud your sense of worth and hope. But today, 1 John 1:9 offers a comforting promise: when you confess your sins honestly, God is faithful to forgive and cleanse you. This isn't about minimizing what's happened but welcoming God's cleansing power that removes the stain of sin completely.

Imagine a spotless white garment after a thorough cleaning — that's how God treats your heart when you come to Him honestly. Psalm 103:12 helps us understand the extent of His forgiveness: He removes our sin as far as the east is from the west. It's not just a partial wipe but an infinite removal.

Isaiah's words remind us that no matter how deep the regret, God's grace can make us new. You don't have to carry your mistakes forever. Confession frees you from doubt and shame and invites God's healing. Take a moment today to bring your feelings before Him openly. He wants to wash you clean, renew your heart, and restore your joy.

Prayer for Today

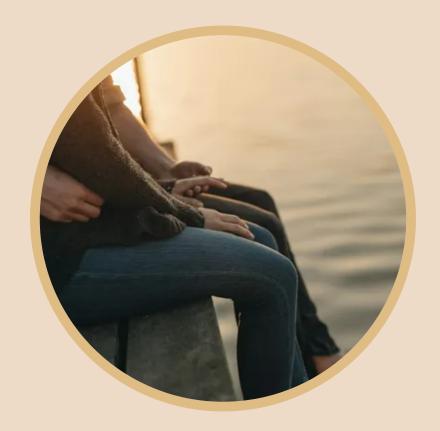

- Galatians 2:20 "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me."
- Ephesians 2:10 "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works."







Day 2: Finding New Identity in Christ

Devotional: Your New Life Is Defined by Christ

Regret often convinces us that our identity is tied to past failures. But God's Word reveals a life-changing truth: when you put your faith in Christ, you become a new creation. 2 Corinthians 5:17 declares that the old you, weighed down by guilt, is gone, replaced by a fresh start.

This new identity isn't about perfection but God's transformative work within you. Galatians 2:20 reminds us that it's Christ living in us now, empowering us to live beyond past mistakes. You are more than what happened yesterday — you are beloved and renewed by God's spirit.

Prayer for Today

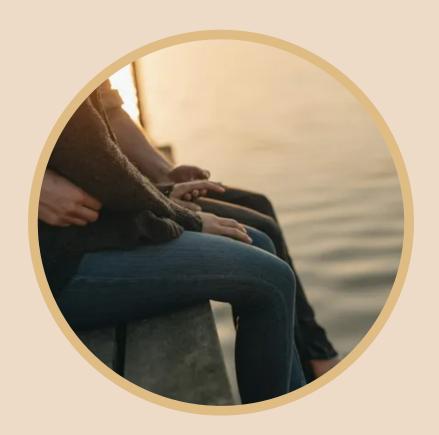

Supporting Scriptures

- Hebrews 12:2 "Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith."
- Psalm 34:18 "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."







Devotional: God's Grace Defeats Shame Completely

Shame is a powerful emotion that often follows regret, convincing us we are unworthy of God's love. Romans 8:1 boldly counters that statement with reassurance: there is no condemnation for those who belong to Jesus. This means that no matter what you've done, God's grace covers you, shielding your heart from shame.

To walk free from shame, Hebrews 12:2 invites us to fix our eyes on Jesus, the one who understands our struggles intimately. He doesn't condemn but perfects our faith, helping us grow stronger and more secure in God's love.

Psalm 34:18 offers comfort that God is especially near when our hearts are broken. Rather than pushing shame away by hiding, invite God into your pain. Let His grace fill the cracks of your brokenness and remind you that your past does not define you.

1.	How has shame affected your relationship with God and others?
2.	What does it mean to you that there is no condemnation in Christ?
3.	How can focusing on Jesus help you shift from shame to grace?







Journaling Prompts

	Write about a time shame tried to silence or isolate you; how would remembering no condemnation change that?
2.	List ways God has shown grace to you despite your feelings of shame.
3.	Reflect on how Jesus' sacrifice relates to your struggles with shame.







Prayer for Today

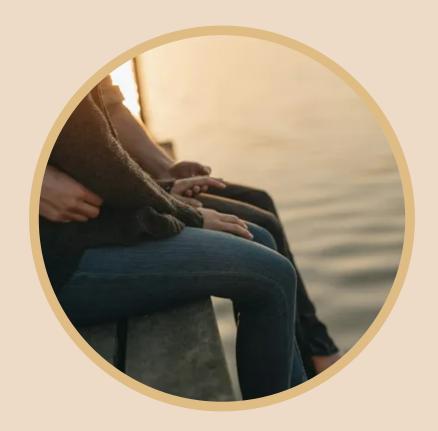

Your Verse

Supporting Scriptures

- Proverbs 28:13 "Whoever conceals their sins does not prosper, but the one who confesses and renounces them finds mercy."
- Joel 2:13 "Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate."







Day 4: 💋 Renewal Through Repentance

Devotional: Turning to God Brings True Renewal

Repentance is more than feeling sorry — it's a turning point that leads to renewal. Acts 3:19 encourages us to repent and turn to God so that our sins are wiped away. If you're struggling with regret, repentance invites you to actively shift your heart and direction toward God.

Proverbs 28:13 warns that hiding sin only deepens our trouble, but confession and renunciation lead to mercy and peace. Being honest with God and others opens the door for healing.

Joel 2:13 reminds us that our God is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love. He eagerly waits for our return. Today, consider what repentance means in your life. It's not about punishment but restoration, a chance to walk in God's light and shed the burden of regret.

Day 4: Benewal Through Repentance

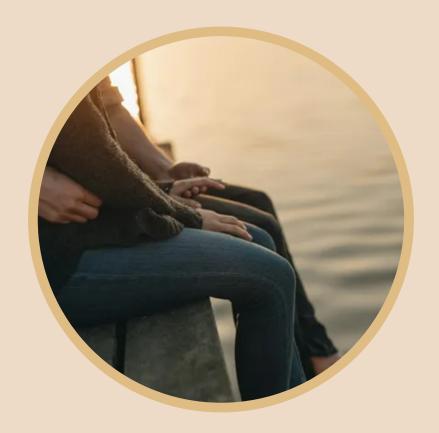
Prayer for Today

Your Verse

Supporting Scriptures

- Psalm 147:3 "He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds."
- Isaiah 43:18–19 "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing!"







Devotional: God's Hopeful Plans Bring Healing

Regret can sometimes make the future seem hopeless. But Jeremiah 29:11 is a powerful reminder that God's plans for you are good — full of hope and a purposeful future. Your mistakes don't disqualify you from His love or the beautiful plans He has prepared.

Psalm 147:3 assures us that God heals the brokenhearted and binds their wounds. He actively restores and strengthens you through your pain.

Isaiah 43:18–19 challenges us to let go of what's behind and embrace the new things God is doing. Healing means moving forward with God's guidance and hope, not being stuck in regret. Trust that God is working to turn your story around, using your experiences to bring growth and blessing to your life and others.

3.	Describe how healing changes your view of your future.







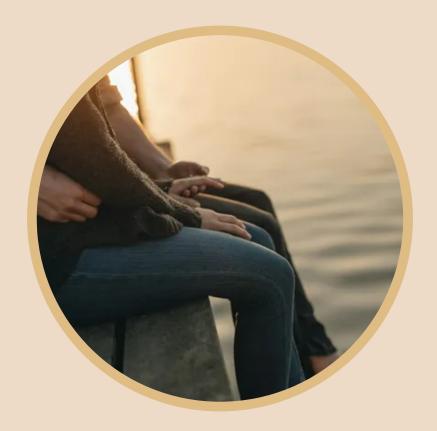
Prayer for Today

- Galatians 6:2 "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."







Devotional: Healing Grows in Community Support

Dealing with regret and healing isn't meant to be a lonely journey. Hebrews 10:24–25 encourages believers to gather together and encourage one another in love and good deeds. Fellowship with others provides strength, hope, and accountability.

Ecclesiastes reminds us that two people support each other and help each other rise when life feels overwhelming. You don't have to face your struggles alone; God's community is a source of encouragement and healing.

Galatians 6:2 calls us to carry each other's burdens, which the law of Christ fulfills. Opening up to a trusted friend, youth leader, or mentor can help carry the weight of regret and foster spiritual growth. Seek out safe spaces where you can share honestly and be uplifted by God's love through others.

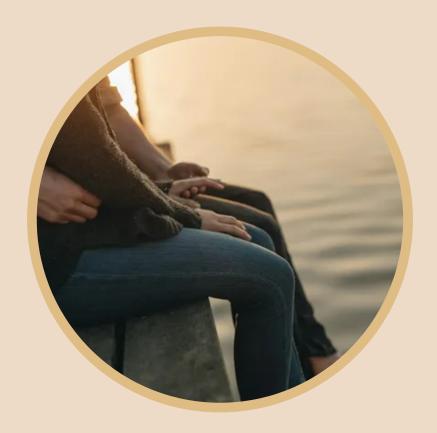
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Your Verse

Devotional: Jesus Frees You to Live Fully

Today marks the beginning of a new chapter — **one of freedom in Christ.**John 8:36 promises that if Jesus frees you, you are truly free. Freedom from regret and sexual sin is possible not by your own strength but through the power of Christ.

Psalm 118:5 reminds us that even in our deepest anguish, God listens and delivers us. You may have experienced heartache, but healing and liberty are available to you.
