Day 1: **//** The Triumphal Entry

Devotional: Welcoming Jesus with Humble Praise

Holy Week begins with celebration and anticipation. The Triumphal Entry marks a moment when Jesus was publicly recognized as the promised Messiah. The crowds welcomed Him with palm branches and joyful shouts, acknowledging His kingship. Yet, Jesus enters humbly, riding on a donkey, symbolizing peace rather than political revolution.

What does this humility teach us? In a world hungry for power and status, Jesus models servant leadership. His kingship is not about dominance but about loving sacrifice. As this day sets the tone for the week, we are reminded to welcome Jesus into our lives with reverence and joy, ready to follow where He leads—even if the path includes suffering.

'You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet."

Supporting Scriptures

- Luke 22:19–20 'This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me.'
- Philippians 2:5-7 'In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus...he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant.'

Devotional: Living the Example of Servant Leadership

The Last Supper reveals deep truths about love and service. Jesus, knowing His impending suffering, chooses to humbly wash His disciples' feet—an act of the lowest servant. This powerful demonstration redefines greatness in His kingdom: true leaders serve others selflessly.

In a culture often focused on status and power, this example challenges us profoundly. Jesus invites us to follow Him by embracing humility and loving service. As we remember the bread and wine as His body and blood, we are reminded of the cost of our salvation and the call to live sacrificially for others.

Your Verse

Matthew 26:38–39 "Then he said to them, 'My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death. Stay here and keep watch with me.' Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, 'My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will."

Supporting Scriptures

- Luke 22:44 'His sweat was like drops of blood falling to the ground.'
- Hebrews 5:7 'During the days of Jesus' life on earth, he offered up prayers and petitions with fervent cries and tears to the one who could save him from death.'







Devotional: Surrendering to God's Will in Trials

In the quiet garden of Gethsemane, Jesus reveals His true humanity. Facing unbearable anguish, He earnestly prays to the Father, wrestling with the weight of the coming cross. This moment shows us the depth of His obedience and submission despite intense suffering.

Jesus' prayer, 'Not my will, but Yours be done,' models surrender beyond our natural inclination. It reminds us that following God often involves hardship and sacrifice, yet trust in His sovereign plan sustains us. Jesus is fully God and fully man—feeling sorrow yet choosing obedience out of love.

As we meditate on this passage, consider the burdens you carry. Like Jesus, you can bring them to God in prayer, seeking His strength to say "yes" to His will in your life.







Reflect and Apply

1.	What fears or burdens am I facing that need to be surrendered to God?
2.	How does Jesus' example in Gethsemane inspire my own prayers in difficult times?
3.	In what ways can I trust God's plan even when it is hard to understand?







Journaling Prompts

1.	Write about a time you struggled to accept God's plan. What helped you surrender?
2.	List areas in your life where you need to pray for strength and obedience.
3.	Reflect on the meaning of 'not my will, but Yours' in your current circumstances.

Your Verse

Luke 23:44-46 "It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, for the sun stopped shining. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Jesus called out with a loud voice, 'Father, into your hands I commit my spirit.' When he had said this, he breathed his last."

Supporting Scriptures

- Isaiah 53:5 'But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities.'
- Romans 5:8 'But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us.'







Devotional: Embracing the Power of the Cross

The crucifixion is the heart of our salvation story. Jesus willingly endured suffering and death, bearing the penalty for our sins to reconcile us to God. The tearing of the temple curtain signifies that through His sacrifice, the barrier between God and humanity was removed, granting us direct access to His presence.

This ultimate act of love reminds us of the cost of grace. No greater love exists than to lay down one's life for others. As believers, we are invited to reflect on the depth of Jesus' compassion and to respond with gratitude and surrender.

Today, meditate on the power of the cross and what it means for your life. Consider how this gift of salvation shapes your identity, hope, and purpose.
