Abraham is neither naive about God's righteousness nor indifferent to the potential loss of innocent lives. Rather, he stands in the gap, pleading, demonstrating profound hope that grace may override judgment.

From Abraham, we learn that intercession is an act of faith and love. It involves standing boldly before a holy God with confidence, yet humility, willing to advocate for mercy on behalf of others. This kind of prayer wrestles with God's justice—it respects it but also holds space for grace.

How often do we pray as Abraham did, persistently and boldly for those facing judgment or hardship? This day invites us to cultivate intercession rooted in trust and hope.
