Whether you are wrestling with personal sin, seeking hope for restoration, or desiring a deeper grasp of God's patience with His people, this study will encourage and equip you. We will see how God's love triumphs over rebellion and how turning back to Him can revive a broken heart and a broken nation. Day 1: 6 The Depths of Wickedness

Devotional: Understanding the Gravity of Sin

Manasseh's story begins in the darkness of rebellion. Though young, he quickly led Judah into deep idolatry and evil practices, even defiling the temple of God. His reign is remembered for wickedness that grieved God deeply.

Sometimes, sin starts subtly but grows fiercely, affecting not just the individual but the community and nation. Manasseh's life challenges us to honestly confront the reality and consequences of sin. Are we aware of how certain choices and attitudes may distance us from God?

Even when walking in rebellion, God's story with us is not over. His patience invites us to examine our hearts and realize just how far we need His grace.

Prayer for Today

Devotional: Embracing God's Loving Discipline

God's justice is real, and sin carries consequences. Manasseh's wickedness brought a heavy judgment—captivity and suffering under Assyria's armies. This discipline was not merely punitive but corrective.

God's warnings often come in unexpected ways, pushing us to re-evaluate our lives and redirect our hearts. Just as a loving parent disciplines a child, God's discipline is an expression of His covenant love, calling us back to Himself.

When we face hardship or correction, it is vital to see God's hand as one of loving correction, not abandonment. This realization helps us respond in humility rather than despair.

2.	What does God's justice reveal about His holiness and love?
3.	Can you see ways God has instructed or disciplined you recently?







Journaling Prompts

	Describe a time you experienced God's correction and how it affected your faith.
2.	Write about your feelings regarding God's justice and mercy.
3.	Reflect on an area where you sense God's call to change your ways.







Prayer for Today

Father, thank You for Your righteous discipline. Help me not to resent correction but to embrace it as a sign of Your loving care. Teach me to recognize when You are guiding me back to the right path and give me a heart willing to change. May Your justice lead me to repentance and restoration. *In Jesus' name, Amen.*

Devotional: The Power of Humble Repentance

Manasseh's turnaround begins when he humbles himself and seeks God's favor. His genuine repentance from a broken heart moved God to hear his plea despite his earlier rebellion.

True repentance involves turning away from sin — not just regret or fear of consequences. It's a heart posture of humility and surrender, trusting in God's grace to restore what sin has broken.

God delights in restoring those who earnestly return to Him. Your own cries for mercy are heard by a compassionate Father who waits to forgive and heal.







Reflect and Apply

1.	What does true repentance mean to you beyond feeling sorry?
	Have you ever experienced a moment of deep humility before God? What did it feel like?
3.	How can you cultivate a contrite and broken heart continually?

1.	Write a prayer expressing your heart's repentance and humility.
	Recall times when God's forgiveness transformed you; describe the experience.
3.	List areas where God is calling you now to genuine repentance.

Day 4: K God's Mercy and Restoration

Devotional: Hope in God's Unfailing Mercy

The heart of the gospel is found in God's mercy. Despite Manasseh's grievous sins, God answered his cry and restored him to his throne. This shows that no sin is beyond God's ability to forgive and heal.

Restoration is more than a return to position; it is a renewal of relationship. God's love does not reject repentant sinners but welcomes them with open arms, transforming their lives.

Like Manasseh, we can find hope that God's mercy can breathe new life into even the darkest situations.

Devotional: Living as a New Creation in God

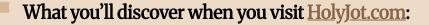




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
