Introduction

Welcome to this 7-day Bible study on King Rehoboam's harshness and the division of Israel. This pivotal moment in biblical history teaches us powerful lessons about leadership, humility, and the consequences of pride. After King Solomon's reign, his son Rehoboam ascended to the throne. When the people requested relief from Solomon's heavy yoke, Rehoboam consulted both older advisors and his peers. Sadly, he chose to follow the harsher counsel of his peers, leading to his harsh response. This harshness caused the kingdom of Israel to split: ten tribes formed the Northern Kingdom under Jeroboam, while Judah and Benjamin remained loyal to Rehoboam. This division signals how leadership choices deeply affect a nation's unity and spiritual health.

Throughout this study, we will delve into Scripture passages highlighting Rehoboam's journey and its consequences. You'll discover the vital role humility plays in leadership and how pride can lead to division and pain. We'll also explore the broader biblical themes of God's justice, mercy, and desire for unity among His people.

As you reflect on these lessons, consider your own life — areas where harshness or pride might be causing division, and where God is calling you toward reconciliation and wisdom. May these days of study encourage a heart of repentance, understanding, and purposeful leadership rooted in God's truth.

















Your Verse

1 Kings 12:1-4 NIV - "Rehoboam went to Shechem, where all Israel had gathered to make him king... The people spoke to Rehoboam: 'Your father put a heavy yoke on us, but now lighten the harsh labor and the heavy yoke your father put on us..."

Supporting Scriptures

- Ecclesiastes 1:9 "There is nothing new under the sun."
- Proverbs 16:18 "Pride goes before destruction, a haughty spirit before a fall."







Devotional: The Weight of a Leader's Legacy

Today, we explore the moment Rehoboam ascended the throne and faced the people's plea. King Solomon left a mixed legacy: wealth, wisdom, but also burdensome taxes and labor demands on the people. The Israelites, feeling weighed down, asked Rehoboam to lighten their load. This moment was Rehoboam's opportunity to respond with wisdom and grace.

His choice would either heal or harm the nation. As leaders or followers, we face similar moments of decision — whether to act with compassion or harshness. Notice the dynamic tension between legacy and innovation, tradition and change. Rehoboam needed humility to hear the people's suffering genuinely.

How often do we inherit circumstances requiring wisdom beyond our years? How do pride and fear influence our choices? Pride can blind us to the needs of those we lead or love. Rehoboam's failure was not just about policy but about listening with a heart open to God's guidance. Let us pray today for the humility to listen well and courage to lead with empathy.

Devotional: Choosing Harshness Over Wisdom

Rehoboam's decision to follow harsh counsel is a sobering reminder of the power of peer influence and the danger of hard-heartedness. Rather than listening to the wise elders who had served his father, Rehoboam chose the advice of his peers, resulting in an exacerbated burden on the people.

This moment reveals the importance of discernment and humility. Leaders are tested in how they weigh counsel and control anger. We all face pressures to conform or respond in defensiveness, but God's way is often the narrow path of listening, patience, and mercy.

Rehoboam's harshness fractured the unity of Israel, showing how pride can lead to division. Today, consider how you receive advice or correction. Are you quick to respond with hardness, or do you pause and seek godly wisdom? This passage challenges us to choose humility over stubbornness and mercy over severity.

3.	How can you cultivate a heart that is 'slow to become angry'?

Lord, teach me to be slow to anger and quick to listen. When faced with pressure, help me choose Your wisdom over my impulses. Protect my heart from pride that hardens and divides. Fill me with Your Spirit so I can respond in love and humility. Thank You for Your patience with me. Empower me to be a peacemaker and servant-leader, reflecting Your grace in all I do. Amen.

Day 3: 🍑 The Kingdom Divided

Devotional: The Cost of Division in God's People

The consequence of Rehoboam's refusal to listen was the tragic division of the kingdom. Ten tribes rejected the Davidic line and made Jeroboam their king. This split not only political but deeply spiritual and cultural hurt the people of Israel profoundly.

God desires His people to live in unity, as Psalm 133 beautifully describes the blessing of harmonious fellowship. Yet when pride and hardness prevail, division and conflict arise. *This passage is a painful example of how poor leadership can fracture communities and sever relationships.*

However, God's overarching plan still moves forward, culminating in the coming Messiah, who is the true King bringing eternal peace and uniting all peoples. This moment invites us to reflect on the consequences of division in our own lives — family, church, workplace — and seek paths toward reconciliation and unity.

Devotional: God's Sovereignty Through Brokenness

Even though the kingdom was divided because of human failure, God's sovereignty remains unshaken. God had declared that the kingdom would be torn from Solomon's line because of disobedience, and He used this division to fulfill His greater purposes.

This truth offers hope when we see chaos or hardship in life. God's ways are higher than ours, and He works through our imperfect actions to accomplish His good plans. We can trust that even painful outcomes are under His control and love.

As you meditate today, surrender your own areas of brokenness and division to God. Invite Him to redeem, restore, and lead you in His perfect will. Remember that His sovereign purposes include working through our mistakes to build His kingdom.

Rehoboam's failure was largely a failure of humility. The Bible consistently teaches that humility precedes wisdom. Pride blocks our ability to lead well and harms relationships, but humility opens the door to God's guidance and grace.

True leadership, according to Scripture, is rooted in justice, mercy, and humility. When we walk humbly with God, we can love others better and make wise decisions, avoiding the pitfalls that shattered Israel under Rehoboam.

Reflect on your own heart today: where might pride be clouding your judgment? Ask God to cultivate humility and grant you wisdom. Remember, God favors the humble and gives them strength to lead as He desires.

Day 6: Bestoring Unity and Peace

Devotional: God's Call to Reconciliation and Unity

Though the division in Israel was severe, there were efforts by later kings like Hezekiah to restore unity through spiritual renewal. Calling the people back to God by celebrating the Passover together was a step toward healing broken relationships and reminding God's people of their shared identity and faith.

This shows us God's heart for reconciliation and wholeness. Wherever division exists, God invites us to be agents of peace and restoration, rooted in love and forgiveness.

Consider today how you can promote unity in your sphere of influence, be it family, church, work, or friendships. Carry the burden of healing with prayer and action, trusting God to mend what is broken.

Devotional: Jesus: The King Who Unites and Restores

Unlike earthly kings who fail, Jesus reigns with wisdom, righteousness, and mercy. His kingdom offers hope beyond division, pride, and hardship. This final day invites you to place your hope and trust in the true King whose reign is eternal.

Reflect on Jesus as the perfect leader—one who listens, serves humbly, and unites His people in love and peace. Let Him guide your heart to reflect His kingdom values daily as you walk forward with hope and faith.
