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Introduction

Devotional: Embracing Jesus' Radical Love for Enemies

Jesus' teaching in Matthew 5:43–44 is revolutionary and challenging. In a world where responding to hurt with hurt is expected, Jesus flips the script. Loving your enemies and praying for persecutors goes against natural human instincts but reflects God's extraordinary love.

As a teen, you might face bullying, unfair treatment, or conflicts with friends and family. Jesus' words invite you to step into His love, choosing forgiveness rather than bitterness or revenge. **This doesn't mean ignoring your feelings or accepting harmful behavior, but rather offering love that breaks the cycle of pain.**

Prayer becomes powerful when we intercede even for those who have hurt us. It softens our hearts and aligns us more with God's perspective. Loving enemies is not just a command but a path to freedom and peace, demonstrating God's love through you.

Let's open our hearts today to consider how Jesus' radical love can change our relationships and bring healing in hard places.

- Psalm 34:18 "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."







Day 2: 7 Growing Forgiveness in Your Heart

Devotional: Letting Go: The Key to True Forgiveness

Forgiveness is a process that starts with letting go of bitterness and anger.

Ephesians 4:31–32 encourages us to replace negative feelings with kindness and compassion. As teens, holding onto hurt can be especially painful, affecting how you feel and relate to others.

Remember that forgiveness doesn't mean forgetting or excusing wrong behavior—it means choosing to release the hold that pain has over your heart. God's forgiveness of us is the perfect model; it's unconditional and transformative.

When you feel overwhelmed by bitterness, turn to God in prayer. Take time to heal and allow His closeness to comfort your broken heart (Psalm 34:18). Forgiveness is often a journey requiring patience and daily commitment, but through God's help, it becomes possible.

Today, reflect on what parts of your heart may need forgiveness and invite God to help you grow in kindness and compassion.

Your Verse

Romans 12:17–21 NIV "Do not repay anyone evil for evil... Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

Supporting Scriptures

- 1 Peter 3:9 "Do not repay evil with evil or insult with insult. On the contrary, repay evil with blessing."
- Matthew 6:14–15 "For if you forgive other people when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you."







Devotional: Overcoming Evil with Good: Active Forgiveness

Living out love and forgiveness daily is the ultimate proof of faith in action. Romans 12:17–21 challenges us to refuse revenge and instead overcome evil by doing good.

As teens, it can be difficult to face those who have wronged you without seeking payback. However, the Bible calls us to a higher standard — to respond with blessings where we might expect curses, to choose peace over conflict.

This choice is not passive. It is a powerful act of courage and obedience that brings healing to relationships and communities. Forgiving others opens the door for God's forgiveness in your life, releasing you from the weight of past hurts.

Today, consider how you can actively show love and forgiveness to those around you, trusting that God will work through your obedience to bring restoration.

2.	What does it mean to "overcome evil with good" in your life?
3.	How can forgiving others impact your relationship with God?







Journaling Prompts

Recall a situation where you chose forgiveness instead of revenge.
Write about a person you can bless or pray for this week.
Explain how forgiveness has changed or could change your heart.







Prayer for Today

Lord Jesus, empower me to live out the love and forgiveness You command. Help me to resist the urge to repay evil with evil and instead overcome it with good. Give me courage to bless those who hurt me and to extend grace as You have extended grace to me. Teach me to walk in freedom and peace, reflecting Your love in every relationship. Amen.







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
