## Devotional: Hospitality: An Act of Kingdom Worship

Hospitality is a divine invitation that goes beyond social etiquette; it is a heartfelt act that reflects God's love and generosity. ## Devotional: Fostering Warmth and Peace at Home

In 1 Timothy 3:2, hospitality is listed as a key character trait for leaders, showing its importance in God's Kingdom. Creating a welcoming atmosphere involves cultivating gentleness, respect, and self-control.

## Devotional: Welcoming Strangers as Christ's Invitation

Opening your home for Kingdom purposes often stretches us beyond our comfort zones. Jesus in Matthew 25:35 ties acts of hospitality directly to serving Him, especially to those who are strangers or in need. Welcoming the unfamiliar—whether cultural, social, or spiritual—requires faith and courage.

Leviticus 19:34 commands us to treat foreigners as natives, emphasizing inclusivity and love that crosses boundaries. Romans 15:7 encourages acceptance just as Christ accepted us, without prejudice or hesitation.

Today, consider who might be outside your typical circle that God is inviting you to welcome. It may be a marginalized person, a new believer, or someone vastly different from you. Opening your home for Kingdom impact sometimes means embracing the uncomfortable to reveal Jesus' radical love.
