Day 1: 7 Foundations: Raising Humble Hearts

Devotional: Establish Humility Early in Life

Proverbs 22:6 reminds parents to guide their children towards the path of righteousness from an early age. In the face of a culture that often promotes self-importance and entitlement, planting the seeds of humility is crucial. Humility is recognizing our dependence on God and valuing others above selfish desires.

As parents, our example matters profoundly. When children see their parents practicing humility—acknowledging mistakes, serving others, and expressing gratitude—they learn to follow suit. *Teaching children to serve and show kindness for the sake of others counters entitlement's demand for privilege without responsibility.* It fosters character that honors God and builds healthy relationships.

Remember that humility is not weakness; it is strength under control and a heart tuned to God's grace. Seeking to cultivate this in your home establishes a foundation for children to grow into adults who delight not in entitled demands but in serving with grateful hearts.

- Ephesians 6:4 NIV "Fathers, do not exasperate your children; instead, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord."







Devotional: Discipline as an Act of Love

In a world that often eschews limits, discipline can feel unpopular. Yet Scripture teaches that setting boundaries is an expression of love and care. **Hebrews 12:11** acknowledges the challenge of discipline but assures us of its eternal benefit—it trains children in righteousness and peace.

Parenting against entitlement means saying "no" when necessary and teaching that not all desires deserve immediate fulfillment. Discipline carefully administered teaches children that actions have consequences and nurtures self-control, an antidote to selfish demands.

Ephesians 6:4 provides balance, warning against provoking children to anger. Discipline should be coupled with grace, explanation, and encouragement, helping children understand the 'why' behind limits. Such loving discipline builds security, respect, and prepares them for the real world where boundaries exist.

Reflect on how you provide consistent, loving boundaries that resist cultural pressure to give in or overindulge children. This is part of guarding their hearts against entitlement's grip.

Devotional: Teaching Thanks as a Lifestyle

Entitlement thrives where gratitude is absent. Yet Scripture calls believers to **give thanks in all circumstances**, a radical posture that acknowledges God as the source of every blessing and cultivates contentment.

As parents, showing gratitude aloud and in attitude teaches children to value what they have rather than what they lack or insist upon. Small daily reminders—saying grace before meals, expressing thanks for acts of kindness, or praising God for simple joys—lay a foundation against the entitlement mindset.

Psalm 107:1 announces God's goodness as the basis for thanksgiving. Help children see beyond material possessions to appreciate God's enduring love and faithfulness, which surpass all temporary things.

Consider your family's expressions of thanks. How often do you pause to reflect on God's blessings, especially when life is hard? Teaching gratitude amidst challenges equips children to choose joy and dependence on God rather than demand and dissatisfaction.

Day 4: Teaching Responsibility and Work

Devotional: Instilling a Strong Work Ethic

The culture of entitlement often resists work, favoring easy gain or expectation of reward without effort. Yet the Bible clearly teaches the value of work and responsibility as part of God's design.

2 Thessalonians 3:10 emphasizes that willingness to work impacts blessings and provision. Teaching children to complete chores, contribute to family life, and apply themselves to tasks counters entitlement by connecting effort with outcome.

Proverbs 12:24 offers wisdom that diligence leads to leadership and blessing, while laziness brings hardship. Encouraging a strong work ethic helps children develop discipline, self-respect, and appreciation for what they have.

As parents, we can set age-appropriate responsibilities and celebrate effort rather than just results. This nurtures perseverance and counters the belief that things are owed without earning them.

Supporting Scriptures

- Philippians 2:4 NIV "Not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others."
- 1 John 3:17 NIV "If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person?"







Devotional: Nurturing Empathy and Love

One antidote to entitlement is cultivating compassion—teaching children to put others first and care deeply for those around them. **Romans 12:10** encourages believers to love genuinely and honor others above themselves.

Selfishness breeds entitlement, but compassion opens the heart to others' needs and God's love. Parents can nurture this by involving children in acts of service, encouraging empathy, and discussing feelings and justice.

Philippians 2:4 explicitly calls us to shift focus from self to others. When children learn this themselves, entitlement softens and is replaced by generosity and kindness.

Consider how your family demonstrates care for neighbors, church family, or those less fortunate. Compassion challenges entitlement by creating a heart posture of gratitude expressed through action.

Day 6: **(**) Guarding Hearts Against Materialism

Your Verse

Matthew 6:19–21 NIV – "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth... But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven."

Supporting Scriptures

- 1 Timothy 6:9 NIV "Those who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap."
- Luke 12:15 NIV "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; life does not consist in an abundance of possessions."







Day 6: **(**) Guarding Hearts Against Materialism

Devotional: Focusing on Eternal Treasures

Entitlement often manifests in craving possessions and equating worth with things. Jesus warns His followers to resist storing up earthly treasures and instead invest in heavenly ones.

Matthew 6:19–21 draws attention to the impermanence of material goods and the eternal value of spiritual riches. Parents can counter consumerism by teaching children that true worth comes from who they are in Christ, not what they own.

Luke 12:15 reminds us to guard against greed, which feeds entitlement. Helping children evaluate media messages and peer pressure equips them to reject the lie that possessions define happiness or status.

Spend time reflecting with your children about what they value most and ask God to realign your family's focus on eternal truths. This fosters contentment and joy beyond material things.

Galatians 3:26-27 NIV - "You are all children of God through faith in Christ Jesus."

Supporting Scriptures

- Ephesians 2:10 NIV "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works."
- Romans 8:15 NIV "For you did not receive a spirit that makes you a slave again to fear, but you received the Spirit of adoption as children of God."







Devotional: Rooting Worth in God's Love

The ultimate solution to entitlement is grounding children's identity in Christ's love rather than worldly approval or possessions. **Galatians 3:26–27** reminds us that through faith, we become God's beloved children, fully accepted and loved.

This identity is not earned or bought but freely given. Teaching children that their worth comes from being God's workmanship (*Ephesians 2:10*) shapes their self-image away from entitlement toward humility and purpose.

Romans 8:15 assures us that the Spirit adopts us as sons and daughters, releasing fear and insecurity that often fuel selfish attitudes. Encouraging children to embrace this identity infuses confidence and gratitude, dismantling entitlement's hold.

End this study by reflecting on your child's spiritual identity and how you can continually reinforce their priceless value in God's eyes above all else.
