- 1 Corinthians 13:1 "If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong..."







Day 1: Strength and Warning for Ephesus

Devotional: Return to Your First Love with Renewed Devotion

The church in Ephesus is commended for its **hard work, perseverance, and intolerance of wickedness**. Jesus acknowledges their zeal and doctrinal purity, qualities every believer should admire and strive for. Yet, the Lord also highlights a critical failure — *they have lost their first love*. This represents a heart that once burned passionately for Christ but has grown cold and mechanical in its service.

Jesus calls the Ephesian believers to remember the depth of their initial love for Him, urging them to repent and rekindle that passion. Without love, all good acts become hollow. This challenge reminds us that purity and labor must be tempered by heartfelt devotion. No matter how disciplined or active we are in faith, our relationship with Christ must remain vibrant and affectionate.

Today, consider whether your faith journey resonates more with duty than delight. Are you driven by obligation or fueled by love? Let this message be a mirror to your heart and an invitation to return to Jesus with renewed affection.

Your Verse

Revelation 3:14–22 – "You are lukewarm—neither hot nor cold... Those whom I love I rebuke and discipline."

Supporting Scriptures

- Proverbs 3:11–12 "My son, do not despise the Lord's discipline... because the Lord disciplines those he loves."
- James 4:8 "Come near to God and he will come near to you."







Day 2: A Correction and Promise for Laodicea

Devotional: Reject Lukewarm Faith; Embrace Christ's Discipline

The Laodicean church faces a severe rebuke for being **lukewarm** — complacent, self-satisfied, and indifferent in their spiritual walk. Jesus exposes their spiritual blindness, warning them of their true poverty despite their claims of wealth. This condition grieves His heart deeply.

Yet, within this sharp correction is a tender promise to those who repent: He stands at the door and knocks, ready to restore fellowship and intimacy. This illustrates the merciful nature of Christ, who doesn't reject lukewarm believers but calls them to renewed zeal and repentance.

We are challenged today to examine our spiritual temperature. Are we passionate and committed, or have we become indifferent? Jesus' loving discipline invites us back into vibrant relationship and warns us against spiritual complacency.

Devotional: Press On Toward the Crown of Eternal Life

The recurring theme in Christ's letters to the churches is clear: victory is possible through Him. Overcomers receive rich rewards — from the tree of life, to a new name, to reigning with Christ. These promises inspire hope and perseverance despite trials and opposition.

Victory is not about flawless perfection but personal faithfulness and endurance in Christ. It involves consistent trust, repentance, and commitment, even when it's costly. Jesus encourages believers to hold fast and assures them of eternal blessings beyond this life.

Reflect on Jesus' powerful affirmation that He empowers us to win. Let this motivate you to persevere, knowing that the ultimate victory has already been secured through Christ's own triumph.

Prayer for Today
