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Introduction

The genealogy of Jesus recorded in *Matthew 1:1–17* offers more than a mere list of names. This genealogy traces the lineage from Abraham to David, then through the exile, and down to Jesus, the Messiah. Exploring this lineage reveals the **promises of God across generations** and the deliberate work of God in history.

Far from a dry historical record, Matthew's genealogy bridges the Old and New Testaments, connecting the promises given to Abraham about blessing all nations and the royal line of David with their fulfillment in Christ. Each name carries significance, some marked by obedience and faith, others by failure and frailty — showcasing God's grace operating amid human imperfection.

As we embark on this 7-day study, we will reflect on the meaning of lineage, the fulfillment of divine promises, and the profound hope that comes from recognizing Jesus as the culmination of God's plan. This genealogy invites us to see ourselves as part of a larger story, woven into God's faithful covenant and plan for salvation.

Throughout the week, we'll discover how God's promises transcend time, how human history is under divine sovereignty, and how Jesus, born into this lineage, brings salvation to all who believe. May this study inspire deep trust







in God's faithfulness and encourage us to honor the heritage of our own faith journey.

Devotional: God's Covenant Promise to Abraham

Matthew 1:1 opens with the declaration connecting Jesus to two pivotal figures in biblical history: David and Abraham. Abraham is known as the father of faith, the recipient of God's covenant promise that through his descendants all nations would be blessed. This promise was not just for one generation but extended as a blessing to all humanity, ultimately fulfilled in Jesus.

As we consider Abraham's role in the genealogy, we should remember that God's promises often require patience and trust. Abraham himself waited years before Isaac was born. Yet God's promise was sure and unwavering. Jesus' place in this lineage is a direct fulfillment of that ancient promise, demonstrating God's faithfulness.

Day 2: 💋 Rooted in David: Royal Line and Promise

Devotional: Jesus, the Eternal King from David's Line

The genealogy highlights King David, a man after God's own heart, whose lineage was crucial in God's redemptive plan. God promised David that his kingdom and throne would be established forever through his descendants. This royal promise was fulfilled ultimately in Jesus, known as the Son of David, who reigns eternally.

Interestingly, Matthew includes the note about Solomon's mother, Uriah's wife, alluding to difficult situations and imperfections in this lineage. This reminds us that God's plan works through imperfect people and broken situations, showcasing His grace and sovereignty.

Jesus' royal heritage grants Him the authority to reign over all creation, and His reign is not limited to earthly kingdoms but extends eternally. As believers, we are invited into His kingdom and reign.

Day 3: 🔇 God's Grace in Brokenness

Devotional: God's Grace Works Through Imperfect Stories

The genealogy includes surprising names and stories, notably Tamar and Rahab, women with complicated pasts. Tamar, who engaged in an unusual and challenging situation with Judah, was an ancestor of Jesus, illustrating how God's grace enters even broken and messy places.

By including such stories, Matthew shows that God's plan often defies human expectations and societal norms. God's faithfulness does not depend on human perfection but on His mercy and purpose.

This tells us that God uses our stories, even those marked by difficulty, to fulfill His promises. It offers hope that no one is beyond God's redemptive reach.

Devotional: Jesus: Blessing All Nations Through Rahab

Rahab, a Canaanite woman and former prostitute, is included in Jesus' genealogy, signaling God's intention to reach beyond the Jewish people to the nations. Rahab's faith and hospitality put her among God's people, illustrating that God's promises are for all who believe, regardless of background.

This inclusion foreshadows the universal scope of Jesus' mission to bring salvation to both Jews and Gentiles. It emphasizes that God's blessing to Abraham—to bless all nations—is being realized in Christ.

We are reminded that lineage is not limited to ethnicity but expanded by faith, and the Church today continues that call to include all people in God's family.

Day 5: Through Exile and Return

Matthew 1:12 - "After the exile to Babylon: Jeconiah was the father of Shealtiel,"

- Jeremiah 29:10 "When seventy years are completed for Babylon, I will come to you and fulfill my good promise to bring you back to this place."
- Ezra 1:1 "The Lord stirred up the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to send a proclamation... to restore the house of the Lord."







Devotional: God's Faithfulness Through Exile and Renewal

The genealogy pauses to declare the exile to Babylon, a time of great trial and disruption for God's people. Yet even in exile, God's promises endure. The mention of Jeconiah roots Jesus' lineage firmly in the history of suffering and return.

This reminds us that God is present in our darkest moments and that exile or hardship is never the end of the story. Just as God restored His people, He restores hope for us today.

Jesus' birth after the exile symbolizes new beginnings, the fulfillment of old promises in a renewed way, reminding believers to hold on to hope through seasons of difficulty.
