Transformation Through Encounter: The Story of Zacchaeus



Explore Zacchaeus' journey of repentance and restoration in Luke 19:1—10 through a transformative 7-day Bible study plan.





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Introduction

Welcome to this 7-day Bible study focusing on the transformative story of Zacchaeus the tax collector, as told in Luke 19:1–10. This passage is a profound example of how an encounter with Jesus can lead to genuine repentance and life-changing restitution. Zacchaeus, once a despised tax collector, experienced a radical transformation that challenges us to consider our own hearts and the changes Jesus desires to bring about in us.

Tax collectors in Jesus' day were often viewed as traitors and sinners because they collected taxes for the Roman oppressors and were notorious for dishonesty. Zacchaeus, being a chief tax collector, was likely wealthy but shunned and looked down upon by his community. His story begins with curiosity and yearning—he climbs a sycamore tree to see Jesus because he was short in stature and eager to catch a glimpse of the Savior.

What follows is a divine encounter that turns Zacchaeus' life upside down. Jesus calls him by name and announces His intention to stay at Zacchaeus' house, signaling acceptance and grace. This moment leads Zacchaeus to an immediate and extraordinary repentance: he promises to give half of his possessions to the poor and to repay four times what he had wrongfully taken. His actions demonstrate that true repentance involves not only remorse but also tangible acts of restitution.

The passage reminds us that Jesus came to seek and save the lost, offering new life and purpose to anyone willing to receive it. Through Zacchaeus, we







see that transformation is possible no matter our past mistakes or social standing. This study will guide you through reflection on repentance, grace, restoration, and the heart of God's mission to redeem sinners.

Let us journey together through these seven days, allowing the Spirit to reveal deeper truths as we meditate on Zacchaeus' story and its implications for our lives today.

Devotional: The Courage to Seek Jesus Above All Else

The story of Zacchaeus begins with a desire—a deep yearning to see Jesus. Despite being disdained as a tax collector, Zacchaeus took the initiative to seek out Jesus, physically climbing a tree to gain a better vantage point. This act symbolizes a heart willing to make an effort to encounter the Savior. What does it mean to seek Jesus today in our busy, distracted lives? Zacchaeus' story encourages us to prioritize Jesus above all, even when obstacles or our own limitations may make that challenging.

Seeking Jesus is the first step in a transformative journey. It requires intentionality, humility, and persistence. Zacchaeus was curious but also brave enough to rise above his reputation and the judgment of others. His example invites us to reflect on whether we are sincerely seeking Jesus with all our hearts or just casually expecting Him to come to us.

As you start this study, ask yourself: Are you actively pursuing God's presence, or are you content with a distant relationship? Jesus honors those who seek Him, and the invitation is open for each of us to draw near.

Devotional: Grace Calls Us Home Despite Our Past

Jesus' invitation to Zacchaeus is astonishing—despite Zacchaeus' reputation as a sinner, Jesus calls him personally and chooses to stay at his house. This moment reveals the heart of Jesus, who seeks connection and offers grace even to those whom society rejects. Imagine how Zacchaeus must have felt: surprised, honored, and perhaps a little vulnerable. Jesus reaches out before Zacchaeus can clean up his life or prove his worth.

God's grace often comes as an unexpected invitation. Instead of condemnation, Jesus offers acceptance and love. This challenges our assumptions about worthiness and reminds us that no one is beyond the reach of God's mercy.

Consider the power of Jesus knowing your name and actively inviting Himself into your life. This personal invitation is the beginning of transformation and restoration. How do we respond when Jesus knocks or calls us? Will we open the door, even when we feel unworthy or ashamed?







Reflect and Apply

How does Jesus' invitation to Zacchaeus affect your understanding of God's grace?
Are you willing to open the door of your life to Jesus, even with your flaws?
What feelings arise when you think about Jesus calling you personally by name?

Devotional: Repentance That Leads to Restoration

True repentance is more than feeling sorry—it is a decisive turning point that leads to concrete change. Zacchaeus exemplifies this by publicly declaring his intention to give away half his wealth to the poor and repay fourfold those he had cheated. His repentance is visible and practical, demonstrating integrity and a desire to make things right.

Repentance demands honesty and courage. Zacchaeus does not hide his past but confronts it with transparency, surrendering to God's leading. His restitution underscores that repentance involves restitution—repairing the damage done where possible.

Reflect on your own life. Are there areas where repentance is needed, and restoration possible? Repentance opens the door to freedom and renewed relationship with God and others. Zacchaeus' story invites us to embrace repentance not as a burden but as a gateway to transformation.

Devotional: New Life Emerges From Meeting Jesus

Transformation is not merely external change but an inner renewal brought about by God's Spirit. When we meet Jesus, our identity shifts; we become new people with new desires, values, and purposes. This change impacts everything: our thoughts, actions, and interactions with others.

Consider what it means for you to be a new creation. Are there old habits or mindsets to lay down so the new self can emerge? Zacchaeus' story shows that lasting change flows from an intimate, personal encounter with Jesus, producing fruits of repentance and love.

Devotional: Restoring What's Broken to Reflect God's Justice

Repentance naturally leads to restitution, the act of making amends and restoring what was lost. Zacchaeus sets an extraordinary example by pledging to repay four times what he had wrongfully taken—a public commitment to justice and mercy.

Restitution heals wounds caused by sin and demonstrates sincere repentance. It restores relationships with others and with God, reflecting the heart of God's justice and love. While the exact restitution Zacchaeus made may not always be possible for us, the principle of seeking to repair harm is vital.

Ask yourself: Are there people or situations in your life needing restoration? What might restitution look like in your context? Embracing restitution paves the way for reconciliation and peace.
