## Devotional: Grace Changes Our View of Others

**Paul's letter begins with gratitude,** commending Philemon's faith and love. This sets the tone for understanding the incredible power of grace—a love and mercy undeserved but freely given by God. Paul's thanks reveal a community marked by transformative grace that impacts relationships.

Grace changes how we perceive others. Onesimus, once a runaway slave, is now described as a "beloved brother." This spiritual transformation challenges cultural norms and calls us to see beyond status or past mistakes. God's grace can break every barrier and open doorways for reconciliation and restoration.

As we reflect, consider how God's grace has transformed your life. Are you willing to extend that grace to someone difficult? Just as Paul's letter is a personal plea for mercy, our lives can be living testimonies of God's power to heal fractured relationships and build up the family of believers.

## Devotional: The Power and Courage to Forgive

**Paul appeals to Philemon's heart,** urging him to receive Onesimus not as a slave, but as a beloved brother. This moment captures the essence of reconciliation and the difficult but necessary work of forgiveness.

Forgiveness is risky and requires humility. Philemon had every reason to be angry. Yet Paul gently reminds him that Onesimus' absence was part of a greater plan—one that allowed for a lasting restoration. Forgiveness frees both parties and points to the gospel's power to renew relationships.

Consider your own life: what relationships need reconciliation? How can you be an agent of peace? Like Philemon, you may have to choose love over pride, grace over justice. God's kingdom thrives when we embrace forgiveness and extend restoration, reflecting Christ's heart to a broken world.
