Jesus modeled this as well; after His resurrection, He explained the Scriptures to His disciples, showing how the whole Old Testament pointed to Him (Luke 24:27). Those early believers didn't just accept teachings blindly but evaluated them daily, checking the Scriptures themselves (Acts 17:11).

Interpreting the Bible rightly requires attention to literary context, historical background, and the Bible's entire message. It's a process of investigation and prayerful study to see Scripture in its fullness, enabling accurate and meaningful application.

Without this awareness, we might misunderstand metaphor as literal fact or miss the purpose behind storytelling. This leads to clearer and more accurate application of Scripture.
