#### Introduction

Matthew 18:23—35 - 'Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants.'

#### **Supporting Scriptures**

- Ephesians 2:4-5 'But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions.'
- Luke 6:36 'Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.'







#### Devotional: God's Overwhelming Mercy in Action

God's mercy is a defining attribute revealed powerfully in the Gospels. In Matthew 18:23—35, Jesus tells a parable about a king who chooses to forgive an enormous debt rather than punish a servant who could not repay. This story challenges the common human tendency to seek strict justice without compassion.

The king's actions demonstrate not only power but a deep mercy that goes beyond what the servant deserves. God's mercy toward us is even more overwhelming because our 'debt' is sin, which separates us from Him. Yet, God does not treat us as our sins deserve. Instead, He extends grace, offering forgiveness and restoring relationship, inviting us into His kingdom.

What does it mean for us that God is this merciful? It means that no matter how heavy our failures, God's mercy is always greater. He desires reconciliation and restoration rather than condemnation. This mercy is a gift, not earned but freely given, highlighting that our standing before God depends not on our merit but on His loving kindness.

As the Gospels unfold, Jesus consistently calls His followers to emulate this mercy in their relationships. Today's passage sets the foundation for understanding forgiveness not as a mere act but as a reflection of God's heart.

Matthew 18:33 - 'Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?'

- Colossians 3:13 'Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone.'
- Mark 11:25 'And when you stand praying, if you hold anything against anyone, forgive them.'







Day 2: Torgiveness: A Response to Mercy

#### Devotional: Forgiveness: Embracing Mercy's Call

Forgiveness is the natural response to receiving God's mercy. In the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant, the king forgave a vast debt only to find the servant unwilling to forgive a much smaller debt owed to him. This contrast highlights a critical lesson: having been forgiven much, we must forgive others.

Forgiving is not always easy. It can challenge our pride, our sense of justice, and even our desire for protection from harm. Yet, Jesus' teaching insists on forgiveness as a command and a reflection of the mercy we have received. Holding onto grudges contradicts the heart of the Gospel and blocks the flow of grace in our lives.

Why is forgiveness so essential? Because it frees us from the bondage of bitterness and resentment, enabling us to live in peace and humility. It also aligns our hearts with God's, who desires reconciliation and restoration with all His creation.

When we forgive, we participate in the divine mercy that transforms lives—our own and those of others. Today's scriptures encourage us to surrender offenses and extend grace as God has extended it to us. This is the pathway to unity and healing within communities and within our hearts.

Day 3: Settling Accounts with Grace and Justice

#### Devotional: Living in the Grace-Justice Balance

#### The balance of justice and grace is at the heart of the Gospel message.

Humans have all fallen short and carry debts of sin that cannot be repaid by works or merit. Yet, God's mercy is not careless tolerance but a deliberate act of grace through Christ.

The settling of accounts in Matthew reminds us that God is just — sin has consequences — but also merciful, choosing to forgive through the sacrifice of Jesus. This divine exchange satisfies justice without condemnation, providing a path to righteousness.

How do we live in this tension between justice and grace? By recognizing our need for grace daily and offering that same grace to others. We submit to God's righteous standard while embracing His forgiveness, becoming ambassadors of reconciliation.

As we conclude this study, reflect on how God's overwhelming mercy should shape not only how we view ourselves but also how we engage with others. Mercy heals, restores, and empowers us to walk in freedom, reflecting the heart of the King who settles accounts with both justice and mercy.
