Introduction

Welcome to this three-day journey through a powerful parable taught by Jesus—the Owner of the Vineyard and the Tenants. This story, found in Mark 12:1–12, reveals the heart of God's relationship with His people and how He sent His Son to bring salvation. Yet, despite God's provision, His Son was rejected, a sobering reminder for us today.

Why did the tenants reject the Son? How are we called to respond to the message of Christ Himself? As we explore this passage and related scriptures together, let's open our hearts to understand God's patience, justice, and love. Each day, we will reflect on the deeper meaning of the parable, the role of Jesus, and what response God desires from us.

The vineyard represents God's people—His beloved creation. The owner (God) entrusts it to tenants (human leaders and ultimately all people). The tenants' rejection of the owner's servants and son reveals humanity's tendency to resist God's guidance. Yet God's plan prevails even through rejection.

Embrace this time to examine your heart and your response to Jesus' message. Let us seek to honor the Owner of the vineyard by accepting His Son fully, following His calling, and bearing fruit for His Kingdom. \triangle

















Your Verse

Mark 12:1—12 - 'A man planted a vineyard, rented it to some farmers, and went away...'

Supporting Scriptures

- Isaiah 5:1-2 'Let me sing for my beloved my love song concerning his vineyard...'
- Matthew 21:33-46 'Jesus told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who planted a vineyard..."







Devotional: God's Heart Revealed in the Parable

The parable of the vineyard is a rich story Jesus told to communicate God's heart toward His people. In Mark 12:1–12, Jesus describes a landowner who plants a vineyard and rents it to tenants. When harvest time comes, the owner sends servants to collect what is due, but the tenants mistreat and even kill them. Finally, he sends his son, hoping they will respect him—yet they reject and kill him too.

This story symbolizes God's relationship with Israel and ultimately points to Jesus Himself. The owner represents God, the vineyard is His chosen people, the tenants are those entrusted to steward His blessings, and the son is Jesus, God's beloved Son sent to redeem.

But the son's rejection reveals the painful truth of humanity's resistance to God's message. It challenges us to consider: How often do we reject God's calling or hinder His work through disbelief or disobedience?

We are invited to reflect on the accountability of the tenants and, by implication, ourselves. Are we good stewards of what God has entrusted to us? Are we open to God's Son, who invites us into abundant life?

As we begin, ask God to open your heart to this parable's profound meaning and to reveal areas where you need transformation.







Reflect and Apply

1.	What does the vineyard represent in your understanding of God's plan?
2.	Have you ever resisted God's message or calling in your life? Why?
3.	How do the tenants' actions challenge your view of stewardship?







Journaling Prompts

1.	Write about a time you ignored or misunderstood God's guidance.
	Describe what being a caretaker of God's 'vineyard' means in your daily life.
3.	Reflect on your current openness to Jesus as the Son sent by God.







Prayer for Today

Lord God, thank You for Your patience and mercy as revealed in the parable of the vineyard. Help me to see my life as part of Your vineyard and to respond faithfully to Your Son's call. *Please soften my heart where it has been resistant* and teach me to be a good steward of all You have entrusted to me. Give me courage to embrace Your message fully and live in a way that honors You. **May my life bear fruit for Your kingdom.** In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.

















Your Verse

Mark 12:6-9 - 'He had one son, whom he loved. He sent him last... but the tenants killed him.'

Supporting Scriptures

- John 1:11 'He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him.'
- Hebrews 12:2 'Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith...'







Devotional: Receiving the Son: Our Response Matters

Focus today on the 'Son whom the owner loved'—Jesus Christ. The tenant's rejection and killing of the son foreshadows the crucifixion, where God's Son was indeed rejected by many. This rejection is not just historical; it continues today whenever people refuse God's invitation.

Jesus came with a message of salvation, love, and restoration, yet many turned away. Yet His love remained unshaken, offering grace and calling all to follow Him.

John 1:11 reminds us that even though He came to His own, they did not receive Him. The question remains: How do we receive Jesus? Are we welcoming Him into our hearts or rejecting Him with apathy or rebellion?

Hebrews 12:2 urges us to fix our eyes on Jesus, trusting Him as the pioneer and perfecter of our faith. His example teaches us to endure and believe despite rejection.

Today, examine how you respond to Jesus' message and presence in your life. Are there areas where you resist Him? Are you willing to accept His love fully and allow it to transform you?







Reflect and Apply

1.	What emotions arise when you think about the rejection Jesus faced?
2.	In what ways might you be resisting Jesus' message today?
3.	How can fixing your eyes on Jesus change your response to Him?







Journaling Prompts

1.	Describe how you first received Jesus in your life.
2.	Reflect on barriers you face in fully accepting Jesus now.
3.	Write a prayer asking God to help you receive Jesus more openly.







Prayer for Today

Lord Jesus, You are the beloved Son sent by the Father, yet You were rejected. I confess times I have struggled to receive Your message and love. *Help me to open my heart wide, to welcome You fully, and to trust Your perfect plan.* Strengthen my faith and help me fix my eyes on You, following Your example of love and endurance. May I be a living reflection of Your grace and truth. In Your precious name I pray, Amen.

















Your Verse

Mark 12:10-11 - 'The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone.'

Supporting Scriptures

- Psalm 118:22 'The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone.'
- John 15:5 'I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me, you will bear much fruit.'







Devotional: Abiding in Christ to Bear Fruit

On our final day, let's consider the outcome and invitation of the parable. Jesus quotes Psalm 118 reminding that the rejected stone becomes the cornerstone. Though rejected, Jesus is foundational to God's plan.

This cornerstone is vital—it supports the whole building. Likewise, Jesus calls us to remain in Him like branches in a vine (John 15:5). Our calling is to bear fruit—love, service, faith, and obedience.

Rejecting Jesus cuts us off from life and fruitfulness. But abiding in Him ensures grace and strength to fulfill our purpose.

So how do we respond to the rejection Jesus endured? By accepting Him, trusting Him as the cornerstone of our lives, and committing to bear fruit that glorifies God.

Reflect on your role as a tenant in God's vineyard today. Embrace the peace that comes from Jesus, the living cornerstone, and commit to bearing fruit through His Spirit's power.







Reflect and Apply

1.	What does it mean for Jesus to be the 'cornerstone' in your life?
2.	How can you remain connected to Jesus to bear fruit?
3.	What fruits does God desire to see in your life?







Journaling Prompts

1.	Write about ways you can 'abide' more deeply in Jesus daily.
2.	List fruits of the Spirit you want to cultivate and grow.
3.	Reflect on how Jesus being your cornerstone changes your outlook.







Prayer for Today

Father God, thank You for making Jesus the cornerstone of our faith. Help me to remain firmly connected to Him like branches to a vine, bearing lasting fruit for Your glory. *Strengthen my spirit to resist rejection of Christ's message* and enable me to live in obedience and love. May my life be a witness to Your grace and power as I serve faithfully in Your vineyard. In Jesus' name, Amen.
