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Introduction

Day 1: Seeing Beyond the Surface

Your Verse

Matthew 15:14 NIV - "Leave them; they are blind guides. If the blind lead the blind, both will fall into a pit."

Supporting Scriptures

- John 9:39 "I have come into this world so that the blind will see and those who see will become blind."
- Luke 6:39 "Can the blind lead the blind? Will they not both fall into a pit?"







Day 1: Seeing Beyond the Surface

Devotional: The Danger of Blind Leadership

Matthew 15:14 offers a sobering image: the blind leading the blind, a double tragedy ending in a fall. Jesus critiques religious leaders who, though respected, lacked true spiritual insight. They followed tradition without understanding God's heart. This blindness is not physical but a spiritual condition that hinders us from seeing truth clearly.

In today's world, it's easy to follow voices that are loud but lack depth or truth. Jesus warns us to discern carefully the source of our guidance. Leaders must have spiritual sight—a deep connection to God's wisdom and humility to serve others rightly.

Ask yourself: Are those you follow leading closer to Christ or away from Him? True leaders point others to life-giving truth, recognizing their own need for God's grace. If you find yourself confused or spiritually stumbling, consider whose voice is influencing you. Jesus invites us to seek Him first — the true Light who opens eyes and guides steps.

Your Verse

John 10:27 NIV - "My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me."

Supporting Scriptures

- Psalm 23:1 "The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing."
- Hebrews 13:20 "Now may the God of peace... equip you with everything good for doing his will."







Day 2: W Jesus, the True Shepherd

Devotional: Following the Voice of the Good Shepherd

In John 10, Jesus describes Himself as the Good Shepherd. His sheep hear His voice and follow because they know His heart. Jesus contrasts Himself with those who lead without care or sight, emphasizing a deeply personal relationship between leader and follower.

When we follow Jesus, our spiritual sight is restored. We no longer walk blindly but with confidence, guided by the One who laid down His life for us. True leadership is not about position or authority but about caring, knowing, and leading others toward life and truth.

Today, reflect on your relationship with Jesus as your Shepherd. Are you attuned to His voice amidst the many calls on your attention? Trusting Him as the ultimate leader brings peace and protection. It also equips us to lead others with integrity and love, following His example.

Supporting Scriptures

- Proverbs 3:5-6 "Trust in the Lord with all your heart... and he will make your paths straight."







Day 3: 🎇 Walking in Spiritual Sight

Devotional: Awakening to Walk in the Light

Paul encourages believers in Ephesians to wake up from spiritual sleep and walk in the light of Christ. This awakening is a call to spiritual sight—to no longer live blindly but to be alert, discerning, and fully alive in God's truth.

Spiritual sight allows us to navigate life's complexities, avoiding pitfalls set by false teachings or worldly distractions. When Christ shines on us, He reveals His path and empowers us to follow it fearlessly.

As we conclude this study, reflect on areas where you need to wake up spiritually. Are there habits or beliefs clouding your vision? Invite Jesus to illuminate those parts of your heart, enabling you to see clearly and lead wisely. Walking in spiritual sight means living in constant awareness of God's presence and purposes.
